REPORT OF THE REVIEW COMMITTEE ON DENTAL PUBLIC HEALTH EDUCATION TO THE COMMISSION ON DENTAL ACCREDITATION

<u>Committee Chair</u>: Dr. Victor Badner. <u>Committee Members</u>: Dr. Bruce Dye, Dr. Maya Popova, and Dr. Robert Weyant. Dr. Shannon Smith-Stephens attended a portion of the meeting. <u>Guests</u> (<u>Open Session Only, Virtual</u>): Dr. Sheila Brear, chief learning officer, American Dental Education Association; Dr. David Cappelli, president, American Board of Dental Public Health; Ms. Kelly Braun, executive director, American Board of Dental Public Health; and Dr. Frances Kim, executive director, American Association of Public Health Dentistry, attended the policy portion of the meeting. <u>Staff Members</u>: Ms. Peggy Soeldner, manager, Advanced Dental Education; Dr. Sherin Tooks, senior director; and Ms. Michele Kendall, senior project assistant, Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA). Ms. Yesenia Ruiz, manager, Advanced Dental Education, attended a portion of the meeting. The meeting of the Review Committee on Dental Public Health Education (DPH RC) was held on January 12, 2024 via a virtual meeting.

CONSIDERATION OF MATTERS RELATED TO DENTAL PUBLIC HEALTH EDUCATION

Report on Dental Public Health Programs Annual Survey Curriculum Section (p. 600): The Review Committee on Dental Public Health Education (DPH RC) noted that the Annual Survey Curriculum Section is reviewed during the Winter Review Committee meeting in the year the survey will be distributed; which will next occur in August/September 2024. The DPH RC considered its discipline-specific Annual Survey Curriculum Section (**Appendix 1, Policy Report p. 600**).

At its Winter 2024 meeting, the DPH RC reviewed each question on the Annual Survey Curriculum Section and determined that the questions on the Curriculum Section for dental public health programs were appropriate in relation to the Accreditation Standards for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health. The DPH RC noted that revised Standards (see below) will be implemented in the future and suggested these changes be considered the next time the Annual Survey Curriculum Section is reviewed. Therefore, the DPH RC recommended that the Curriculum Section for dental public health programs be retained with no changes.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Commission on Dental Accreditation direct the Dental Public Health Annual Survey Curriculum Section for dental public health programs (**Appendix 1, Policy Report p. 600**) be retained with no changes for use in Fall 2024.

<u>Consideration of Proposed Revisions to the Accreditation Standards for Advanced</u> <u>Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health (p. 601)</u>: The Accreditation Standards for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health were adopted by the Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) at its August 3, 2018 meeting for immediate implementation. According to the Commission's Policy on Assessing the Validity and Reliability of the Accreditation Standards, "the validity and reliability of accreditation standards will be assessed after they have been in effect for a period of time equal to the minimum academic length of the accredited program plus three years." Thus, the validity and reliability of the standards for a one-year program will be assessed after four (4) years. Therefore, the validity and reliability study for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health was initiated in the Spring of 2022.

At its Summer 2022 meeting, the Commission on Dental Accreditation considered the report of the Dental Public Health Education Review Committee (DPH RC) related to the discipline's Accreditation Standards and the Report of the 2022 Validity and Reliability Study of the Accreditation Standards for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health. The DPH RC recommended that, to ensure a thorough review of data and the comments received, further study of the Validity and Reliability Study data was warranted. Following consideration of the DPH RC report at its Summer 2022 meeting, the Commission on Dental Accreditation directed the establishment of a workgroup composed of current Dental Public Health Review Committee members and no more than two (2) additional individuals, one (1) representing the American Board of Dental Public Health (ABDPH), and one (1) representing the American Association of Public Health Dentistry (AAPHD), to further study the findings of the Validity and Reliability Study and identify Accreditation Standards, if any, which warrant revision. The Commission additionally directed that the workgroup study the proposed revisions to the Accreditation Standards for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health in conjunction with its study of the findings of the Validity and Reliability study and identify Accreditation Standards, if any, which warrant revision. The Commission directed a report on the workgroups work for consideration by the Dental Public Health Review Committee and Commission in Winter 2023.

As directed by the Commission, the Ad Hoc Committee on Dental Public Health convened a series of five (5) meetings in Fall 2022 and, following extensive discussion, determined revisions to several Standards within the Accreditation Standards for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health was warranted.

At its Winter 2023 meeting, the DPH RC considered the work of the Ad Hoc Committee on Dental Public Health and the proposed revisions to the Accreditation Standards for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health. After discussion, the committee accepted the Ad Hoc Committee's proposed revisions, and determined that an additional revision was warranted to Standard 4-9, amending the use of the term "unique" to "vulnerable" regarding patient populations and experiences of students/residents in public health dental care settings.

Following discussion, the DPH RC believed that the proposed revisions to the Accreditation Standards for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health was warranted and recommended that the proposed revisions be circulated to the communities of interest for one (1) year for review and comment, with further consideration of comments received by the Review Committee and Commission in Winter 2024. At its Winter 2023 meeting, the Commission on Dental Accreditation concurred with the recommendation of the DPH RC and directed circulation of the proposed revisions to the Accreditation Standards for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health (**Appendix 1, Policy Report p. 601**) to the communities of interest for review and comment for a period of one (1) year, with Hearings in conjunction with the March 2023 American Dental Education Association (ADEA) Annual Session and the October 2023 American Dental Association (ADA) Annual Meeting, with comments reviewed at the Commission's Winter 2024 meetings.

In accordance with the Commission's Winter 2023 directive, the Accreditation Standards for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health were circulated for a period of one (1) year for review and comment. The Commission received one (1) comment during the Hearing in conjunction with the March 2023 American Dental Education Association (ADEA) Annual Session (**Appendix 2, Policy Report p. 601**). The Commission received no (0) comments during the Hearing in conjunction with the October 2023 American Dental Association (ADA) Annual Meeting. The Commission received nine (9) written comments via its electronic comment portal, prior to the December 1, 2023 deadline (**Appendix 3, Policy Report p. 601**).

At its Winter 2024 meeting, the Dental Public Health Review Committee considered the proposed revisions to the Accreditation Standards for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health and all comments received prior to the December 1, 2023 deadline. The DPH RC reviewed all written comments received, noting the responses varied and included responses in favor of the revisions and additions, as well as some that believed the revisions were too rigorous and others that believed the revisions were not sufficiently rigorous. The DPH RC noted most of the written comments related to the proposed addition of Standard 4-9, related to experiences in public health dental care settings. Further many comments related to experiences gained by students/residents prior to entering a dental public health program and how that experience might be applied to the achieving Dental Public Health Accreditation requirements.

The DPH RC carefully reviewed the proposed Standard 4-9 as well as the written comments. The DPH RC discussed whether students/residents with prior postdoctoral experience in a public health dental care setting should be granted an exemption to the requirements. The DPH RC agreed a total exemption should not be granted; however, an alternate method to achieve the requirement for students/residents entering a program with prior experience is acceptable. Accordingly, the DPH RC revised the proposed Standard 4-9 to allow students/residents entering the program with prior postdoctoral experience in a public health dental care setting an alternate method to fulfil the requirement. Following discussion, the DPH RC determined no additional modifications to the proposed revisions were warranted. The DPH RC also discussed comments related to the proposed Standard 4-9 in relation to the required field experience, noting that these are two different requirements. The Committee also noted that licensure and liability issues are no different for the require that a dental public health student/resident perform clinical care at the site chosen to meet this requirement. Finally, the site used to fulfill Standard 4-9 may address one (1) or more of the dental public health competencies.

The DPH RC also discussed whether the modified revisions warrant additional circulation to the communities of interest and determined additional circulation is not warranted because the modified revisions are not substantial in nature and allow greater flexibility to address the concerns noted during the comment period. The DPH RC discussed an implementation period for the proposed revisions and believed an implementation date of July 1, 2025 would provide programs, both full-time and part-time, sufficient time to ensure compliance with all revisions at the time of implementation.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Commission on Dental Accreditation adopt the proposed revisions to the Accreditation Standards for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health found in **Appendix 1** and direct revision of all related documents, for implementation July 1, 2025.

Consideration of Proposed Revisions to Improve Diversity in Dental and Dental Related Education Programs (p. 602): On December 1, 2023, the Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) received a letter from The National Coalition of Dentists for Health Equity (TNCDHE). The request is found in Appendix 1, Policy Report p. 602. In its letter, TNCDHE provides short-term and long-term suggestions to CODA to improve diversity in all academic dental, allied dental, and advanced dental education programs.

At its Winter 2024 meeting, the Review Committee on Dental Public Health Education (DPH RC) reviewed the letter from The National Coalition of Dentists for Health Equity including the short-term and long-term suggestions, including the suggestions related to efforts in ensuring more diverse site visit teams, better training of site visit teams to assess educational programs, and considering the language used in Standards related to diversity. The DPH RC agreed diversity and providing opportunity is important but believed the suggestions provided are somewhat restrictive and difficult to achieve, noting the suggestion related to more diverse site visit teams and the current difficulty in recruiting qualified site visitors. Through discussion, the DPH RC also learned that a workgroup has been studying the predoctoral dental education Accreditation Standards for possible revision, including the areas noted in the letter from TNCDHE.

Following considerable discussion, the DPH RC agreed diversity is an important topic and expressed interest in participating with other advanced dental education review committee chairs in assessing the Accreditation Standards to address the concerns noted in the letter from TNCDHE. Because of the common Standards among the advanced dental education Standards, the DPH RC believed an Ad Hoc Committee of other advanced dental education Commissioners should be formed to discuss whether revisions are warranted and to ensure consistency in revisions, if warranted.

<u>Recommendation</u>: It is recommended that the Commission on Dental Accreditation direct establishment of an Ad Hoc Committee composed of all advanced dental education Commissioners to study the Accreditation Standards for possible revision related to the letter from The National Coalition of Dentists for Health Equity.

The Review Committee on Dental Public Health Education considered site visitor appointments for 2024-2025. The Committee's recommendations on the appointments of individuals are included in a separate report.

ACCREDITATION STATUS DEFINITIONS

1. PROGRAMS THAT ARE FULLY OPERATIONAL: 3

Approval (*without reporting requirements*): An accreditation classification granted to an 4 5 educational program indicating that the program achieves or exceeds the basic requirements for accreditation. 6

- 7 8 Approval (*with reporting requirements*): An accreditation classification granted to an educational program indicating that specific deficiencies or weaknesses exist in one or more areas of the 9 program. Evidence of compliance with the cited standards or policies must be demonstrated within 10 a timeframe not to exceed eighteen (18) months if the program is between one and two years in 11 length or two years if the program is at least two years in length. If the deficiencies are not 12 corrected within the specified time period, accreditation will be withdrawn, unless the Commission 13 extends the period for achieving compliance for good cause. Identification of new deficiencies 14
- during the reporting time period will not result in a modification of the specified deadline for 15 compliance with prior deficiencies. 16
- 17

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- Circumstances under which an extension for good cause would be granted include, but are not 18 19 limited to:
 - sudden changes in institutional commitment;
 - natural disaster which affects affiliated agreements between institutions; faculty support; or • facilities:
 - changes in institutional accreditation;
 - interruption of an educational program due to unforeseen circumstances that take faculty, • administrators or students away from the program.

2. PROGRAMS THAT ARE NOT FULLY OPERATIONAL: A program which has not 28 enrolled and graduated at least one class of students/residents and does not have students/residents 29 enrolled in each year of the program is defined by the Commission as not fully operational. The 30 accreditation classification granted by the Commission on Dental Accreditation to programs which 31 are not fully operational is "initial accreditation." When initial accreditation status is granted to a 32 33 developing education program, it is in effect through the projected enrollment date. However, if enrollment of the first class is delayed for two consecutive years following the projected enrollment 34 date, the program's accreditation will be discontinued, and the institution must reapply for initial 35 accreditation and update pertinent information on program development. Following this, the 36 Commission will reconsider granting initial accreditation status. 37

- 39 Initial Accreditation is the accreditation classification granted to any dental, advanced dental or allied dental education program which is not yet fully operational. This accreditation classification 40 provides evidence to educational institutions, licensing bodies, government or other granting 41 agencies that, at the time of initial evaluation(s), the developing education program has the potential
- 42
- for meeting the standards set forth in the requirements for an accredited educational program for the 43 specific occupational area. The classification "initial accreditation" is granted based upon one or 44

Preface

2 Maintaining and improving the quality of advanced dental education programs is a primary aim of

the Commission on Dental Accreditation. The Commission is recognized by the public, the
 profession, and the United States Department of Education as the specialized accrediting agency in
 dentistry.

7 Accreditation of advanced dental education programs is a voluntary effort of all parties involved.

8 The process of accreditation assures students/residents, the dental profession, specialty boards and 9 the public that accredited training programs are in compliance with published standards.

10

11 Accreditation is extended to institutions offering acceptable programs in the following discipline of

12 advanced dental education: dental public health, endodontics, oral and maxillofacial pathology, oral

and maxillofacial radiology, oral and maxillofacial surgery, orthodontics and dentofacial

14 orthopedics, pediatric dentistry, periodontics, prosthodontics. Advanced education in general

dentistry, general practice dentistry, dental anesthesiology, oral medicine, and orofacial pain.

16 Program accreditation will be withdrawn when the training program no longer conforms to the

standards as specified in this document, when all first-year positions remain vacant for a period of

18 two years or when a program fails to respond to requests for program information. Exceptions for 19 non-enrollment may be made by the Commission for programs with "approval without reporting

non-enrollment may be made by the Commission for programs with "approval <u>without</u> reporting
 requirements" status upon receipt of a formal request from an institution stating reasons why the

- 21 status of the program should not be withdrawn.
- 22

Advanced dental education may be offered on either a certificate-only or certificate and degree-granting basis.

Accreditation actions by the Commission on Dental Accreditation are based upon information

27 gained through written submissions by program directors and evaluations made on site by assigned

site visitors. The Commission has established review committees to review site visit and progress
 reports and make recommendations to the Commission. Review committees are composed of

representatives nominated by dental organizations and nationally accepted certifying boards. The

- 31 Commission has the ultimate responsibility for determining a program's accreditation status. The
- Commission has the utilitate responsibility for determining a program's decreditation status. The Commission is also responsible for adjudication of appeals of adverse decisions and has established
- policies and procedures for appeal. A copy of policies and procedures may be obtained from the

34 Director, Commission on Dental Accreditation, 211 East Chicago Avenue, Chicago, Illinois 60611.

This document constitutes the standards by which the Commission on Dental Accreditation and its site visitors will evaluate advanced dental education programs in each discipline for accreditation

purposes. The Commission on Dental Accreditation establishes general standards which are

common to all disciplines of advanced dental education, institution and programs. Each discipline

develops discipline-specific standards for education programs in its discipline. The general and
 discipline-specific standards, subsequent to approval by the Commission on Dental Accreditation,

41 discipline-specific standards, subsequent to approval by the Commission on Dental Accreditation, 42 set forth the standards for the education content, instructional activities, patient care responsibilities,

42 set form the standards for the education content, instructional activities, patient care responsionities43 supervision and facilities that should be provided by programs in the particular discipline.

Dental Public Health Standards

- As a learned profession entrusted by the public to provide for its oral health and general well-being,
 the profession provides care without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, age, disability,
 sexual orientation, status with respect to public assistance or marital status.

5 The profession has a duty to consider patients' preferences, and their social, economic and

6 emotional circumstances when providing care, as well as to attend to patients whose medical,

7 physical and psychological or social situation make it necessary to modify normal dental routines in

8 order to provide dental treatment. These individuals include, but are not limited to, people with

9 developmental disabilities, cognitive impairments, complex medical problems, significant physical

10 limitations, and the vulnerable elderly. The Standards reconfirm and emphasize the importance of

educational processes and goals for comprehensive patient care and encourage patient-centered
 approaches in teaching, research and oral health care delivery.

14 The profession adheres to ethical principles of honesty, compassion, kindness, respect, integrity,

15 fairness and charity, as exemplified in the ADA Principles of Ethics and Code of Professional

16 Conduct and the ADEA Statement on Professionalism in Dental Education.

17

18 General standards are identified by the use of a single numerical listing (e.g., 1). Discipline-specific

standards are identified by the use of multiple numerical listings (e.g. 1-1, 1-1.2, 1-2).

21 In October 1997 and revised in 2016, the American Association of Public Health Dentistry

approved "Competency Statements for Dental Public Health". This document outlines the

competencies expected of a public health dentist. The term competency has been used to denote

the knowledge, skills, and values necessary to function as a specialist in dental public health. It is

25 expected that the specialist will perform these skills at the competent level.

Definitions of Terms Used in Dental Public Health Accreditation Standards

The terms used in this document (i.e. shall, **must**, should, can and may) were selected carefully and
indicate the relative weight that the Commission attaches to each statement. The definitions of
these words used in the Standards are as follows:

- 8 Must or Shall: Indicates an imperative need and/or duty; an essential or indispensable item;
 9 mandatory.

Intent: Intent statements are presented to provide clarification to the advanced dental education programs in dental public health in the application of and in connection with compliance with the Accreditation Standards for Advanced Dental Education Programs in Dental Public Health. The statements of intent set forth some of the reasons and purposes for the particular Standards. As

- such, these statements are not exclusive or exhaustive. Other purposes may apply.

- Examples of evidence to demonstrate compliance include: Desirable condition, practice or
 documentation indicating the freedom or liberty to follow a suggested alternative.
- 20 Should: Indicates a method to achieve the standard; highly desirable, but not mandatory.
- 21 May or Could: Indicates freedom or liberty to follow a suggested alternative.

22 Graduates of discipline-specific advanced dental education programs provide unique services to the

- 23 public. While there is some commonality with services provided by specialists and general dentists,
- as well as commonalities among the specialties, the educational standards developed to prepare
- 25 graduates of discipline-specific advanced dental education programs for independent practice
- should not be viewed as a continuum from general dentistry. Each discipline defines the educational
- 27 experience best suited to prepare its graduates to provide that unique discipline service.

 29 Competencies: Statements in the advanced dental education standards describing the knowledge,
 30 skills and values expected of graduates of discipline-specific advanced dental education programs.

STANDARD 1 - INSTITUTIONAL COMMITMENT/PROGRAM EFFECTIVENESS

The program **must** develop clearly stated goals and objectives appropriate to advanced dental education, addressing education, patient care, research and service. Planning for, evaluation of and improvement of educational quality for the program **must** be broad-based, systematic, continuous and designed to promote achievement of program goals related to education, patient care, research and service.

9 The program must document its effectiveness using a formal and ongoing outcomes
10 assessment process to include measures of advanced dental education student/resident
11 achievement.

13 *Intent:* The Commission on Dental Accreditation expects each program to define its own goals

14 and objectives for preparing individuals for the practice of dental public health and that one of

15 *the program goals is to comprehensively prepare competent individuals to initially practice*

16 *dental public health. The outcomes process includes steps to: (a) develop clear, measurable*
